Why Build Relationships?

 Politics and Legislation are heavily influenced by personal relationships.


 We listen to those we know personally!

Tip O'Neill: "All politics is local."



Let's Cover Some Misunderstandings...

- Persuasion Does Not Mean Corruption.
- Legislators are normal people: they don't know everything, making relationships even more important!
- Legislators need additional insight, just like anyone else.





What Should I Know?

Get To Know Your Legislator!

Many Representatives have a biography on their site.

• Do Your Homework. Know who they are, what they've done,

and where they stand!





Who Do I Talk To?

- Find Your Legislator! Using https://www.house.gov/representative esentative representative
- You'll often reach staffers long before the Representative.
- Take the time to work with their office.
- Work with **local officials!**





Where Do I Begin?

- Email your Legislator!
- Contact the office of your legislator.
- Introduce Yourself! You have qualifications, let them know!
- Legislators know they always have a broader audience.





Making An Appointment


- If you're in their **district**, you can generally make an appointment.
- **Senate** members and staffers are **harder** to **reach**, takes more time.
- House members and staff usually try to be available for constituents.
- Remember: they want to stay in office!





Attending Community Meetings

- Find what **community events** your Representative is **attending**.
- Research the state/community events they are likely to attend.
- Community **Town Halls**, local meet-and-greets, openings, etc.
- Use this opportunity to introduce yourself, not to force an issue.





Inviting Representatives

- Invite your Representative to meet your organization.
- A reason to attend: let them speak, invite to contribute to an event, awards when appropriate.
- A reason to come back: give people a chance to share their story, a fact sheet, a thank-youletter.



Invite the **Media**: Coverage=Votes!



Other Ways to Introduce Yourself

• Attend **fundraisers** they are attending.

 Bring other MFT's to meet with the legislator.

 Testify at a Congressional or state legislative hearing/public comment session.

Hold a legislative briefing, invite staff.

See if you have a mutual acquaintance!



Maintaining the Relationship

- Always come prepared: know your facts!
- Be a reliable source of information: Be the person they can go to with questions.
- Be completely open and honest about the effects of policies you support.





Maintaining the Relationship

Know and respect their limitations.

 Never be a nuisance! Don't abuse the relationship!

• **Keep in contact** after first meeting them. Thank them for their work and support.







Why Do We Care?

- Legislators are people too: they need information.
- There will always be more **issues** to tackle.
- Sharing information helps us understand what the future will bring us.
- Building a strong foundation today for tomorrow's benefit.
